1. Read Proverbs 4:11,14. Our life is a journey to a destination and we all choose what path we will take in our life. Proverbs talks about two paths we can choose. The path that we choose will determine where we end up; not our intentions, not our goals, not our dreams. What does this mean to you?
2. There are two kinds of wisdom fighting for our trust; the wisdom of this world and the wisdom of God. What are some things that have helped you choose the wisdom of God?
3. Read Proverbs 3:6. That doesn't mean He will make our path easy, but it means that He will make the path clear to us that we should take. Is there a time that God made the path clear for you?
4. Read Proverbs 3:7. The thing that can knock us off of God's path for our life quicker than anything else is our pride. What are some ways to help keep us from becoming wise in our own eyes?
5. Read Proverbs 2:1-10. God guarantees that if you seek Him with all your heart He will give you your heart's desires. What are some ways that we can do that?
6. Read Proverbs 3:9-10. We honor God by putting Him first. What are some ways that we can do that and what are the blessings when we do?
7. Read Proverbs 18:21. What are some steps we can take for our words to bring glory to God and to bless others?
8. Read Proverbs 6:16-17. One way to help us grow in humility is to never forget the cross. If I fill my heart with the wonder of the cross of Christ, where could there possibly be any room left for my pride? What does that mean to you?
9. Read Proverbs 24:3. If we build our home with God's wisdom on a foundation of understanding, our priorities must be in order. What are those priorities?
10. Read Proverbs 13:20. Hang with the wise and you'll become wise. Hang with the fools and you'll become a fool. And for some reason, most people believe they will be the exception to the rule. What does this mean to you?
11. Read Proverbs 3:5. Solomon was the wisest man who ever lived. He was also one of the richest and most powerful. But when it came time for him to recommend where we should put our trust, he did not say "trust in Solomon" and he did not say "trust in yourself." How can we put this into practice in our everyday life?
